As the new Store Committee Chairperson I can readily appreciate past progress made at the store that is reflected in the significant infrastructure and process improvement initiatives made over the past several years. Those past improvements along with the generous donations we receive from you in the surrounding area have clearly made the thrift store a beacon of hope in the local community by enhancing the quality of life of the needy people we so proudly serve.

In 2009 we will focus on implementing lasting changes to the thrift store business processes to better serve the needs of our customers. Implementing simple changes to store procedures will make the store more efficient and successful. With the help of store staff members and our gracious and dedicated volunteers we plan to make a team effort to move the store forward using a set of attainable process improvement goals.

Our first goal is to improve the shopping experience of our customers by providing the largest selection and quantity of store merchandise that our store space can accommodate. We have already begun making the store more functional by organizing areas to maximize available space. Better use of space increases merchandise selection and improves the shopping experience. Similar to changes in the front of the store, our second goal is to establish procedures to make the warehouse more efficient.

Effective housekeeping is key to moving goods in and out of the store so we began cleaning and organizing the warehouse areas. We will then standardized procedures to improve the process of receiving and sorting donations along with organizing temporary storage of sold merchandise awaiting pick-up or delivery. To make these changes happen we need your help. We cannot do it alone.

My closing message is to ask you to please consider giving some of your time individually or teaming with your friends and community associates to come to the store and help. Coordinating your volunteer support is easy to do by calling 618-799-8505. When you volunteer at the thrift store you will find an enriching and rewarding experience. You will quickly see you are making a positive impact on our customers who depend

on the store to improve the basic needs of their every day lives.

MOBILE SOUP KITCHEN

The mobile kitchen is going strong. We have been blessed with two new drivers and a new serving crew. Paul Wolf and Jim Kalmer are our new drivers. Members of St. Joseph in Freeburg comprise our new crew. They have all gone out on their own and are enjoying their new ministry.

After several months of planning, there is an official committee formed to keep the bus on the road and to help develop the ministry to its fullest. This is an exciting accomplishment and will help to assure the continuation of the ministry into the future.

It has been a goal of the mobile kitchen ministry to use them in times of emergency and weather crisis situations, such as excessive heat or cold. The kitchens are equipped with a small refrigerator and propane stove and a microwave. Now we have the capability to keep food available at times when the vehicles are on the road for long periods of time.

The Belleville Council Voice of the Poor Committee meets the second Tuesday of the odd numbered months. We invite you to join our efforts to defend the rights of those who are suffering from injustice at our next meeting on March 10th at 7 PM at the Mount Carmel Cemetery Peace Chapel located at 10101 West Main.

The Society of St. Vincent de Paul is steadfastly dedicated to extending both arms of charity-direct service and advocacy- to try to address the root causes of social injustices. We are committed to speaking out to protect the rights of the poor. In this effort we are working to create social consciousness about critical issues that affect the poor. Affordable housing is one such issue and we sent the following flier to parishes for thoughtful consideration and prayer.



Affordable Housing



Is it an Option?

The answer to this question for many is no! In this country and in this day and age it is very sad that affordable housing has become such a grave issue. The cost of putting a roof over one's head often far exceeds earnings and the housing dilemma poses critical concerns for us all. The problems once faced by those considered poor are now confronting more and more Americans. It is vital for each of us to examine the facts and stand up for what is right. The following are true scenarios.(The names have been changed to protect privacy)

Cindy and Robert are married with three children. The oldest child, age 7, became extremely ill in June and required hospitalization for almost 6 months for a deadly infection. The family is grateful-the child has remarkably recovered. Through the traumatic illness, Robert, a skilled carpenter, lost his job because he was missing too much time to be at the hospital. Cindy, consumed with caring for her gravely ill son and other children ages two and four, was also missing work. Unable to catch up on back rent, the family was recently evicted from their home. Possessions lost, they have been reduced to living in their car and begging family and friends for a place to stay whenever possible. Their son returned to school in January. Cindy is back to work

as a dishwasher and Robert has been pounding the pavement looking for work as a carpenter. The Society of St. Vincent de Paul is working to find them affordable housing. For the present, the family will be in a shelter. They are grateful. They are together...

Debra and Jack have been married for 20 years. Jack lost his minimum wage job due to the economy. A chronic nervous condition has prevented Debra from working for years. They have two sons' ages 16 and 18-both in special education. The high school found a job for the oldest son 3 days a week bussing tables. The younger boy is just starting a similar job. The family rents a house in rural St. Clair County for \$125 month. They heat with kerosene. The Society of St. Vincent de Paul is assisting them. Theirs is a classic case of substandard housing and poverty.

Rhonda and Tim are in their forties. They are engaged and have always enjoyed a comfortable lifestyle. Tim has been employed with a company for many years making a decent salary. Rhonda is a hairdresser also making a comfortable living. They pay their bills on time-that is until now. They have no savings. Three weeks ago, Tim was let go at work due to downsizing. Rhonda meanwhile had a devastating accident and will be unable to work for months while she recovers from serious injuries. The rent is due, neither is eligible for unemployment and they are scared. St. Vincent de Paul is helping them. Their rent is \$750 a month. They cannot afford their present rent with zero income. Where can they go?

Belinda is 56 years old.. She is divorced and has always taken care of herself. She has lived in a nice apartment paying \$825 month rent. Recently she collapsed at work. The Doctor told her she would have to be off work 10 weeks. She applied for short-term disability. She has been paying premiums monthly. Three weeks ago she was informed that she was 2 days shy of qualifying for short-term disability. She has no income and no family. She's being evicted in 10 days. She does not know what to do with her belongings or where to go. St. Vincent de Paul is helping her. Temporary housing must be found. She is slumping into a deep depression.

These are true stories. What can we do?

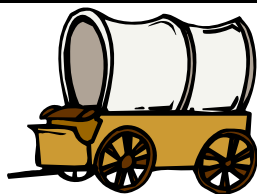
